To: Friends and Colleagues:

I'm pleased to provide you with the documented history of our free, all-expenses paid programs for journalists during 2009. It was an outstanding year, in which we helped more journalists in more countries than ever before, through our unique brand of content-oriented material.



As you know, journalism is now in a transition phase in the delivery phase of news and information. The century-old financial model for newspapers and over-the-air broadcasting is giving way to new platforms and fee-based services. The concept of what news is – is changing: is it what I put on my Facebook page, a Twitter posting that grabs attention, or a thorough and well-vetted piece that raises questions about how our tax dollars are spent.

At NPF, we seek to serve everyone who is honestly trying to find out facts, and convey them to the public. The platform used to present the information doesn't matter to us. In our programs we have words-on-paper types, online reporters, videographers, and cable television producers.

If you do the count, nearly 300 journalists benefitted from our training in Washington, around the world, online and through webinars. They did this through 41 days of direct programming and 10 additional days in which people who'd gone through our programs held training sessions for their colleagues, using our material. They heard from 161 speakers – leaders in their fields – and attended new media training sessions led by our staff.

OVERVIEW

The Paul Miller Fellowships are a unique program for journalists assigned to cover Washington on behalf of regional news organizations. In 2009-2010, twenty fellows dedicated one day a month for nine months to intensive study sessions on subjects like the federal budget, the federal court system, and national defense. They met with experts, senior government officials, and veteran journalists for on-the-record discussions about the inner workings of the nation's capital.

The program has become a "rite of passage" for regional reporters and editors, who must contend with Washington's torrent of complicated news.

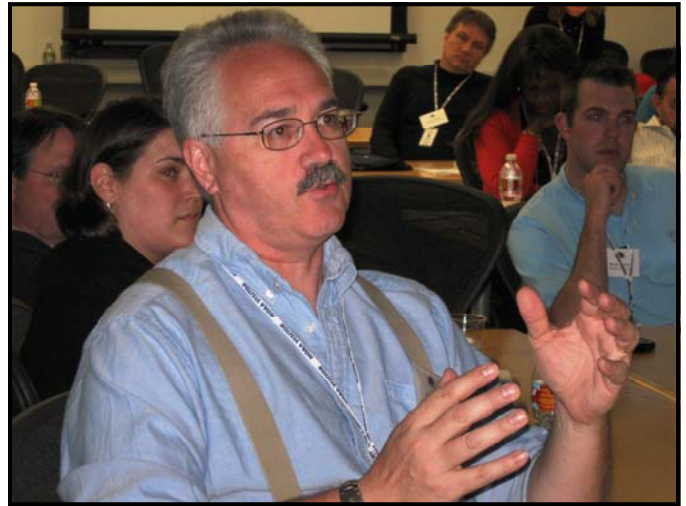

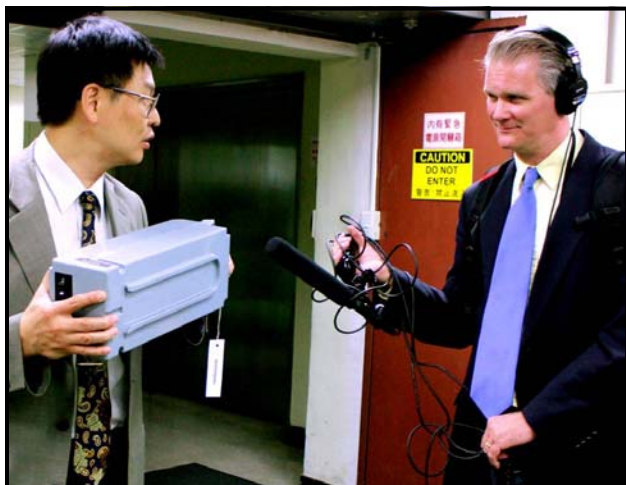

After our 2008 collaboration with the International AIDS Society in Cape Town, South Africa, we invited each of the attending journalists to create a similar j2j briefing in his or her home town. The journalists were instructed to conduct a 60-90 minute discussion based on issues covered in the J2J sessions or IAS meetings. Recommended topics of discussion included a basic overview of HIV/AIDS, prevention strategies, and treatment methods. We asked fellows to produce a written report.

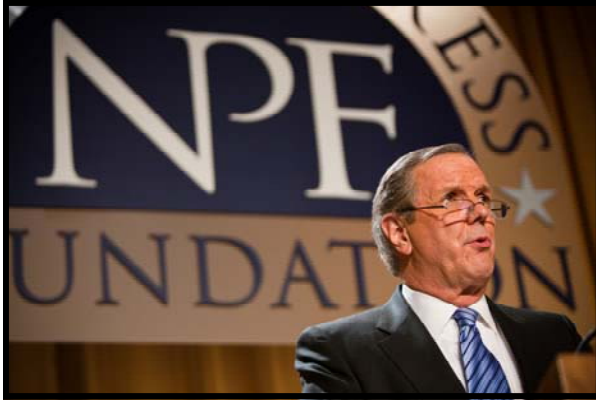

BILL ADAIR, EDITOR



POLITIFACT.COM is a fact-checking Web site launched in August 2007 by the St. Petersburg Times and Congressional Quarterly. During the presidential campaign, reporters and researchers from the Times and CQ examined more than 750 statements and rated them on PolitiFact's Truth-O-Meter, which showed whether they were True, Mostly True, Half True, Barely True or False. The most ridiculous falsehoods earned the lowest rating, Pants on Fire. PolitiFact is now using the Truth-O-Meter to fact-check the Obama administration, Congress, trade associations and anyone else who speaks up in Washington.



BILL ADAIR is the editor of PolitiFact and the Washington Bureau Chief for the St. Petersburg Times. In nearly 20 years with the Times, he has covered the White House, Congress, aviation safety and state and local politics. He's worked in Washington since 1997 and is the author of "The Mystery of Flight 427: Inside a Crash Investigation," which was published in 2002. He won the Everett Dirksen Award in 1998 for his investigative reporting about a member of the Florida delegation, and last year he received the National Press Foundation's Special Citation for a story that explored how the phrase "Bridge to Nowhere" had transformed American politics. He lives in Arlington, Va. with his wife Katherine and three children.

CLIFFORD K. AND JAMES T. BERRYMAN AWARD FOR EDITORIAL CARTOONING
NATE BEELER, WASHINGTON EXAMINER

Nate Beeler has been the editorial cartoonist for *the Washington Examiner* since 2005. His cartooning career began at his high school's student newspaper in Columbus, Ohio, and then he went on to earn a journalism degree at American University in 2002. Beeler has won the three other major college cartooning awards – the Charles M. Schulz Award, the John Locher Award and first place in the SPJ Mark of Excellence Awards. In 2007, he won the Golden Spike Award, as voted upon by members of the Association of American Editorial Cartoonists at its 50th anniversary convention in Washington.

His cartoons also appear in *The San Francisco Examiner* and *The Baltimore Examiner* and have been featured in *USA Today*, the *Los Angeles Times*, *The Arizona Republic*, *The Cincinnati Enquirer*, *The Indianapolis Star*, *The Providence Journal*, and many other publications. Beeler is syndicated internationally to more than 800 newspapers by Cagle Cartoons. In addition to editorial cartooning, he also draws full-color caricatures for the Examiner newspapers each week. He lives in Alexandria, Virginia.



BENJAMIN C. BRADLEE EDITOR OF THE YEAR AWARD
LEONARD DOWNIE, THE WASHINGTON POST



LEONARD DOWNIE, JR. served as Executive Editor of *The Washington Post* for 17 years, from September 1, 1991, until September 8, 2008. He is now a Vice President At Large at *The Washington Post Co.* Downie joined *The Post* as a summer intern in 1964. As a reporter he won two Washington-Baltimore Newspaper Guild Front Page awards, The American Bar Association Gavel Award for legal reporting, and the John Hancock Award for excellent business and financial writing. He worked on the Metropolitan staff as a reporter and editor for 15 years, and ran the staff as Assistant Managing Editor for Metropolitan news from 1974 until 1979.

As Deputy Metropolitan Editor, Downie helped supervise *The Post's* Watergate coverage. He was named London correspondent in 1979 and returned to Washington in 1982 as National Editor. In 1984, he became Managing Editor under Executive Editor Ben Bradlee. During Downie's 17 years as executive editor, The Post News staff won 25 Pulitzer Prizes, including three Pulitzer Gold Medals for Public Service.

Born May 1, 1942, Downie grew up in Cleveland, Ohio, and received his BA and MA degrees in journalism and political science from Ohio State University. He received an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Ohio State in June 1993.

In 1971-72 he spent a year on leave from *The Post* on an Alicia Patterson Foundation Fellowship, studying urban problems in the United States and Europe. Downie is the author of four non-fiction books and the just published novel, *The Rules of the Game* (Random House). He lives in Washington with his wife, Janice. They have a blended family of six children: David, Scott, Joshua and Sarah Downie and Brian and Sara Glick.

SOL TAISHOFF AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN BROADCAST JOURNALISM

CHARLES GIBSON

ANCHOR, "ABC'S WORLD NEWS WITH CHARLES GIBSON"



Charles Gibson is anchor of ABC's flagship broadcast "ABC's World News," as well as the network's principal anchor for breaking news, election coverage and special events. He is one of the most distinguished journalists in television with more than 40 years' experience, 33 of those at ABC News in many network leadership positions. He was named anchor of "World News" in May 2006.

During the 2008 election cycle, he has covered the pivotal primaries and caucuses, reporting from the scene in Iowa, New Hampshire and Texas. He moderated back-to-back presidential debates in Manchester, NH just days before the first-in-the-nation primary in that state. He moderated a Democratic debate at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, which was the most-watched debate of the entire primary cycle.

Before being named anchor of "World News," Mr. Gibson was co-anchor of "Good Morning America." He returned to "GMA" to re-launch the broadcast with Diane Sawyer on January 18, 1999. On September 11, 2001, Mr. Gibson, along with Ms. Sawyer, began the network's award-winning coverage of the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

In February 2003, he anchored "GMA" from the Johnson Space Center in Houston following the loss of the Space Shuttle Columbia. Mr. Gibson won an Emmy for his hour-long "Primetime Thursday" investigation entitled "Columbia Final Mission."

In 2004 he sat down with major league baseball legend Pete Rose, who admitted for the first time that he had bet on baseball.

He has interviewed leaders from around the globe, including Kofi Annan, Tony Blair, the late Yasir Arafat and Nelson Mandela. He traveled to Israel in April 2002 to cover the crisis of suicide bombings, and reported from Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt, in October 2000 to cover the Middle East peace summit.

Mr. Gibson came to ABC News in 1975 from a syndicated news service, Television News Inc. (TVN), which he joined in 1974. From 1970 to 1973 he was an anchor and reporter for WJLA-TV (then WMAL-TV), the ABC affiliate in Washington, DC. Prior to joining WJLA-TV, he had been news director for WLVA-TV and Radio in Lynchburg, Virginia. His first job in broadcasting was Washington producer for RKO Network in 1966.

Mr. Gibson is a graduate of Princeton University, where he was news director for the University's radio station, WPRB-FM. A native of Evanston, Illinois, he grew up in Washington, DC. He and his wife, Arlene, live in New York. They have two daughters and one grandson.

JONATHAN ALLEN is a political reporter with Congressional Quarterly, where he started his Washington journalism career in 2000. In two stints at CQ, he has covered House and Senate leadership, the budget and appropriations, national political conventions, and the 2008 presidential election for the online, daily and weekly publications. He was The Hill newspaper's Senate reporter from the fall of 2005 through the fall of 2006.

Jonathan is a frequent guest political analyst on national television and radio programs, including Hardball with Chris Matthews and On the Record with Greta Van Susteren. In 2008 he won the National Press Club's Sandy Hume Memorial Award for excellence in political journalism, awarded annually to a reporter who is 34 years old or younger. He is a graduate of the University of Maryland and lives in Washington with his wife, Stephanie Allen.

HAL BERNTON has been a staff reporter with The Seattle Times since 2000, where he has been involved in regional, military and investigative reporting. After Sept. 11, he traveled to France and North Africa to research the life of Ahmed Ressam, a young Algerian who was caught smuggling explosives through Washington. In December of 2003, he went to Iraq to cover the war and in 2005 he was in Indonesia to report on aid efforts in the aftermath of the tsunami.

Bernton previously worked for The Oregonian and The Anchorage Daily News, where he was part of a team that won the 1989 Pulitzer Prize for Public Service. He was born in Washington D.C. and started his journalism career as an intern for the late columnist Jack Anderson. Bernton, 54, is married to Ann Hodgson Bernton and they have two children – Matthew, 21, and Mary, 19.

DAVID HEATH is an investigative reporter at The Seattle Times. In recent years, he's written about Congressional earmarks, corporate deception, financial conflicts in medical research and terrorism. Heath has won numerous national awards, including the Goldsmith Prize, the George Polk, the Heywood Brown and the Gerald Loeb. He is a three-time Pulitzer Prize finalist for work he did with others. Heath was also a Neiman Fellow at Harvard University in 2006 and he taught journalism at Harvard's summer school and at the University of Washington.

THE CHAIRMAN'S CITATION
AUSTIN H. KIPLINGER



Austin H. Kiplinger, editor emeritus of *The Kiplinger Letter*, has had a distinguished journalism career spanning more than five decades as a reporter, broadcast commentator and editor, specializing in business and political affairs.

At Cornell University he worked for the *Ithaca Journal* and the *Associated Press* After graduating Phi Beta Kappa from Cornell in 1939, his full-time reporting career began in 1940 with the *San Francisco Chronicle*. In World War II he served as a Navy aviator in the South Pacific. After the war he helped launch *Changing Times*, the nation's first magazine of personal money management, now titled *Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine*.

In 1948, Mr. Kiplinger became the front-page daily columnist of the *Chicago Journal of Commerce*. During the 1950s, he was a Chicago newscaster for the ABC and NBC television networks. He was part of the ABC team of the 1952 political conventions in Chicago. He covered the 1956 conventions with NBC. After rejoining the Kiplinger Washington Editors, he succeeded his father, W.M. Kiplinger, as editor-in-chief, in 1961. Mr. Kiplinger is joined in the business by his son, Knight, editor-in-chief and publisher of *Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine* and the *Kiplinger Letters*.

Maintaining a life-long interest in civic and educational affairs, he is Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Trustees of Cornell University, former President of Tudor Place Foundation, former chairman of the Federal City Council and co-chairman of the Leadership Committee for the City Museum of Washington. He serves on the board of the National Symphony Orchestra and as a trustee of the National Press Foundation. He is a 57-year member of the National Press Club.

A native of Washington, D.C., Mr. Kiplinger did graduate study in economics at Harvard University. He is the co-author of four books dealing with economic issues. He holds honorary degrees from Union College, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Bryant College, St. Mary's College of Maryland, Ohio State University and the University of Idaho.

The W.M. Award for Distinguished Contribution to Journalism has been given to Ms. Rice and the Johnson family in honor of their more than 60 years of publishing excellence.

It was the opinion of NPF judges that the publications cover their community thoroughly and intently, while never losing sight of the need to inform and entertain.

Articles in the magazines can be candid, frothy or change history—the pictures of the murdered Emmett Till in his coffin, published in *Jet* in 1955, spurred the emergence of the civil rights movement.

The company, based in Chicago, has offices around the country. The company also owns the Fashion Fair Cosmetics Company and a traveling fashion show.

Ms. Rice has a Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism from the Annenberg School for Communication at the University of Southern California and a Masters in Business Administration from the Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management. 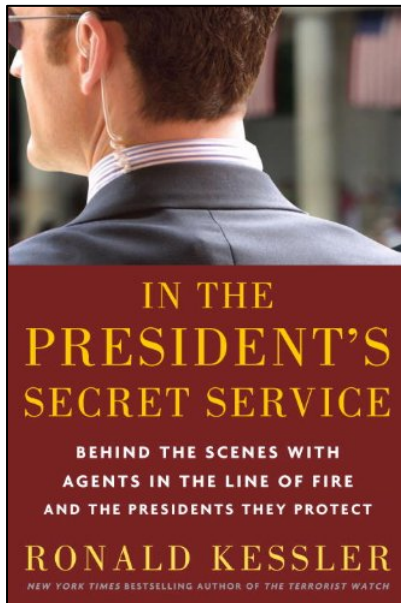

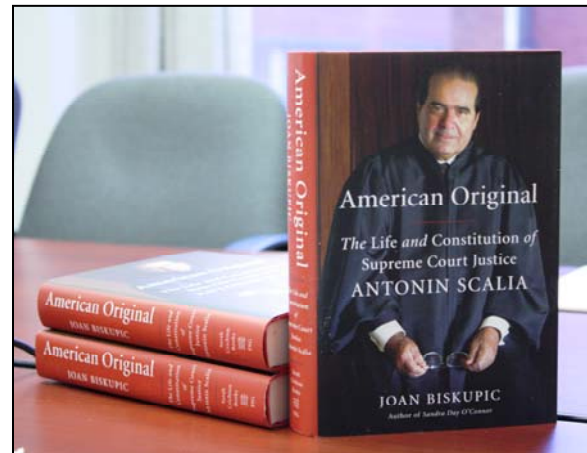

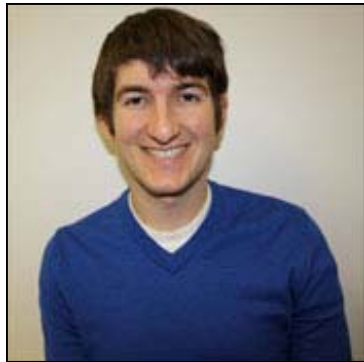
KERRY BUKER
