
Our annual awards celebrate high achievement, but they also serve as inspiration to others to reach higher, dig deeper, and stand firm in their commitment to truth.

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

When the National Press Foundation was incorporated 50 years ago, the U.S. news industry was fresh off landmark investigations – Watergate and the Pentagon Papers – inspiring a new generation of journalists in their mission of holding power to account.

Today, there are approximately 25,000 *fewer* working journalists in the country, covering 125 million more people in a relentless 24/7 environment changed irrevocably by the internet, social media and now AI. Yet journalists' dedication to truth and accountability has not changed and will not change – making more urgent NPF's mission of making good journalists better.

As societal pressures mount and newsroom budgets shrink, NPF provides mentorship and guidance that is increasingly rare. There has never been a greater need for our no-cost, beat-specific training. NPF makes an impact – and our work in 2024 was no exception.

NPF remains dedicated to keeping our programs broadly accessible and directly applicable. In 2024, NPF trainings served about 300 journalists through our in-person trainings and many more through collaborations and webinars, or through story kits, videos and other resources.

NPF recruited more than 150 speakers to share their expertise with journalists, from Singapore to Washington, D.C. and New Orleans to Montana. Out of these trainings, fellows produced thousands of stories and broadcasts, each one contributing to a better informed public.

NPF can look back upon many successes – in 2024 and throughout its 50 years – but what I’m most excited about is the future. Our journalism fellows are committed to reporting important stories, building trust and truth-telling. NPF is aided in its mission by the support of generous donors and grantmakers who help ensure the strength of journalism in the years ahead. Journalists need our support and it is the National Press Foundation’s privilege to provide it.

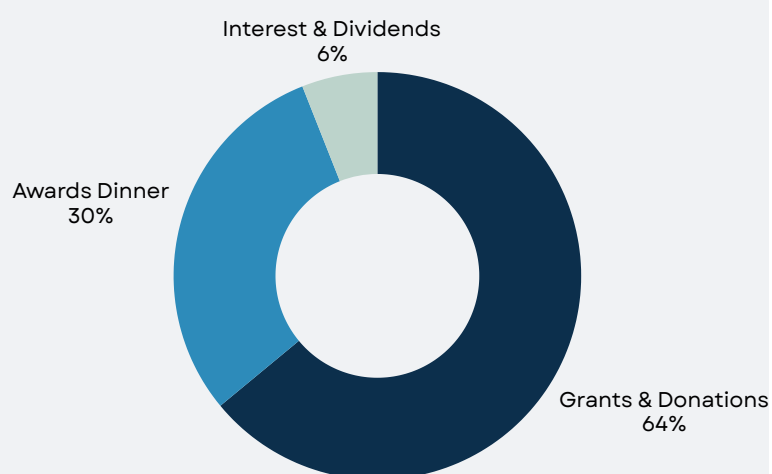

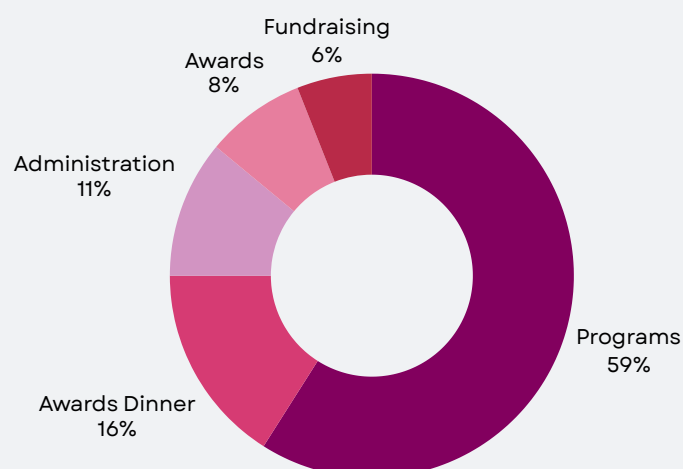

OUR MISSION AND VISION

The National Press Foundation’s mission is to make good journalists better. NPF educates journalists on the complex issues of the day and trains them on the latest reporting tools and techniques. The foundation recognizes and encourages excellence in journalism through its awards and programs. We pursue our mission with two guiding priorities: providing journalism training that is broadly accessible and directly applicable.

For 50 years, the National Press Foundation has lived up to its motto of “making good journalists better” by training journalists on complex and multifaceted topics so they can better educate the public. NPF teaches necessary skills to journalists in every medium at no cost to the individuals or their newsrooms.

MEETING A CRITICAL NEED

In today’s increasingly diversified information landscape, factual reporting is needed more than ever across all industries and sectors. A flourishing democracy requires an independent, fact-based press to provide the trustworthy information all communities need and deserve.

Journalists are a megaphone to the world, shining a light on corruption and wrongdoing, yet they face attacks, harassment and general distrust. On top of that, the demands of 24/7, multi-platform coverage put them under unprecedented pressure. The U.S. media corps is trending younger; many are paid low wages and have less time to deliver more stories.



A number of high-profile newsroom leaders have left their jobs, citing exhaustion. News organizations have weathered mass layoffs in already lean newsrooms. All of this means that although the need is great, few newsrooms have time or resources to devote to reporters’ training and growth.

Against this background, the National Press Foundation’s work is more essential now than ever before. NPF provides a needed service – to the news industry and to the communities who rely on journalists for fair and accurate information. NPF, as a journalism support organization, provides critical infrastructure and partnership that strengthens newsrooms of all means and all sizes, from fledgling start-ups to legacy institutions that must restructure to survive. NPF provides knowledge and resources, builds cooperative cohorts, and helps connect early-career journalists with supportive mentors. NPF’s work strengthens the field of journalism and improves the news we consume through the training and skill-building we provide to make good journalists better.

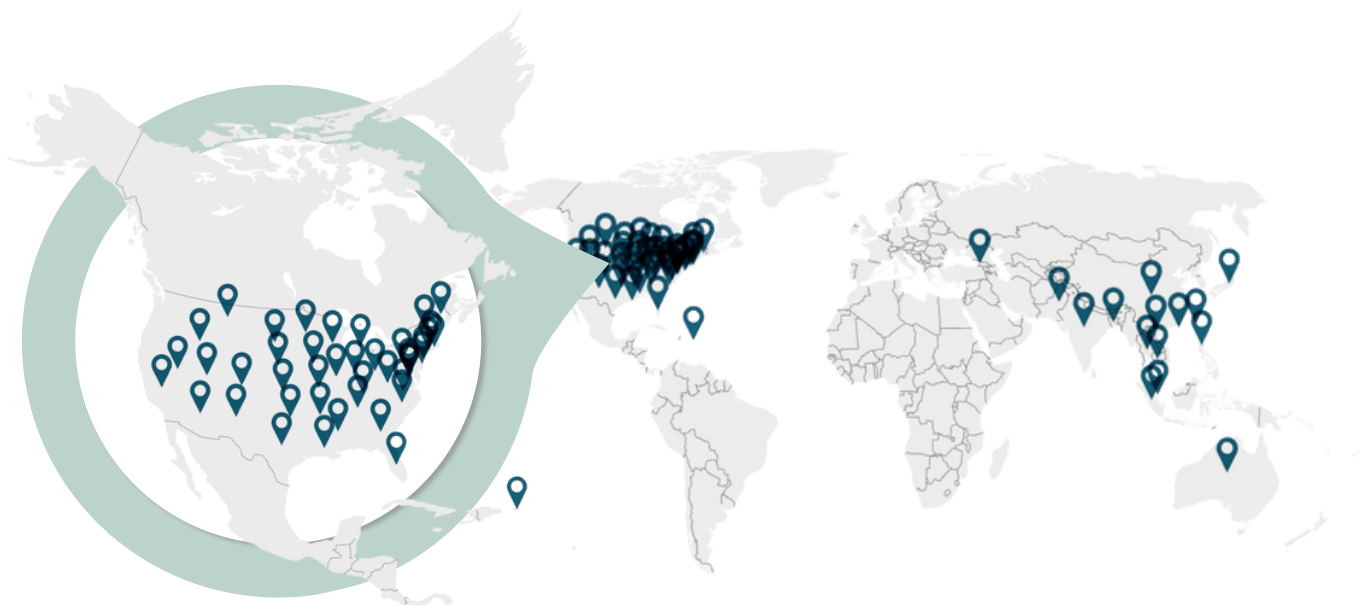

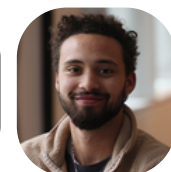

American journalism is experiencing a severe and systemic diversity crisis. There are not enough reporters and editors of color to accurately reflect our society. This lack of representation contributes to public mistrust, and newsrooms have made inconsistent progress in retaining and promoting diverse talent.

The National Press Foundation’s year-long, expenses-paid Widening the Pipeline program for early-career journalists of color was launched in 2022 and has directly confronted these issues. The 2024 cohort was NPF’s second and a third began in January 2025. The fellowship begins and ends with in-person multi-day workshops, bookending virtual sessions held roughly once per month. The sessions provide fellows with the skills needed to thrive in newsrooms as they are – and help create better newsrooms for tomorrow.
